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

Bellefonte is the seat of Justice containing an Academy, Court house and Jail. The town is supplied with water from an excellent spring, by means of a Conduit.

The general character of the soil is extremely diversified, the head of country lying in the West side of the Allegheny is generally poor and broken with deep barrens, and in many places rocky; but mostly well timbered. And between the Allegheny and Bald Eagle are, a stony ridge, which produces tolerably well when cultivated. Along the Bald Eagle Creek are fine extensive bottoms of the first quality. The hills east of the Bald Eagle ridge are mostly good limestone lands, including in several places pine barrens. This country produces the various kinds of grain common in Pennsylvania, with good effect, but wheat is the most profitable crop in the limestone lands, and corn in the Bald Eagle bottoms. The mountains are partly well timbered, and not so steep and rocky as in some other parts of the State. The country about Philipsburgh is considered very good for grazing and produces Corn very well.  
The mountains may be estimated at from six to fifteen hundred feet as perpendicular height above the river. The Allegheny is much the highest, those of the second class are Station and Supper. The principal timber with some maple, pine, oak, ash, maple and beech, but in the banks of the Allegheny Hemlock and Laurel abound. The minerals discovered in this county are Iron, Stone-coal and Marl. There is a mineral spring full water near Millsbrook between Bellefonte and Philipsburgh which is said to possess healing qualities. Bald Eagle & Big Lick springs are navigable in parts of the year for Boats &c. Spring and Shultz creek and the best streams in the State for running machinery, has numerous sites plenty of water all the year and never freezes. Iron and Spring creeks are also strong streams affording numerous sites of water power. The Allegheny rapid stream affording full on half of the water of Bellefonte to a remarkable fall across through the great Allegheny the strong springs of this river it is said that no human being has ever been able to pass along its channel. The mountain Cores and water falls are numerous in the limestone lands.
